

QUICK TIPS FOR DEBRIS MANAGEMENT FOR WCID110 AND BEST TRASH



If debris falls on your property from a neighbor, it is now your debris and your responsibility to deal with.

Same goes for trees. Unless you have made someone aware of a dead tree in writing through certified mail, it is now your tree to deal with.

Sorting debris is key and allows for fewer collection stops. Make piles of similar types of debris:

- Vegetation includes branches and limbs, tree trunks or tree sections, root balls, leaves/pine needles, anything else that is vegetation
- Construction / Demolition
- Fencing
- Appliances
- Electronics

Make sure your debris piles are:

- on your property.
- piled high to minimize impact to the grass on your property.
- not placed near trees, poles, hydrants, mailboxes or other structures
- not in the street
- not blocking a sidewalk.
- not blocking storm drainage or storm sewers.
- close to the curb.

When WCID110 provides debris pick up through Best Trash, any bagged debris in any color bag will be accepted. Bagged or bundled debris can also be picked up with normal trash pick-up schedule.

When Precinct 3 provides debris pick up, they will only accept debris in clear bags.

When WCID110 provides debris pick up through Best Trash, a grapple truck will be used for collecting piles. Once they have collected a pile, they will move on. Any remaining debris (small limbs, leaves, etc.) are your responsibility.

Branches/limbs can be cut and bundled for normal trash pick up as well as bagged debris.
